This unit has 6 hours of lectures over Monday and Wednesday. The unit introduces the student to the study of the New Testament. It establishes the student's knowledge and skill base for reading the New Testament in literary, theological and historical fashion as an integral part of a teaching ministry. BS102 Greek 1A

It focuses on morphology, grammar, and vocabulary, assisting students to understand New Testament Greek at a word/sentence level. It relates to the other units in the subject area by introducing students to the nature of language, and equipping students with skills for translation and exegesis.

CT120 Church History 1

The unit explores the origins and development of the orthodox and catholic tradition through historical study of the early church (70-451AD) and briefly surveys Christian developments through the middle ages. It traces the history of Christianity beyond the period studied in New Testament 1, it is foundational for the study of both Doctrine 2 and Church History 2. It will assist the graduate in, developing an appreciation of primary sources, knowledge of the key developments of the period, capacity for historical research, and a greater self-understanding within the Catholic tradition.

CT122 History of Christian Mission (Advanced Diploma)

This unit contributes to the course by giving students an understanding of Christian mission history which will lay a foundation for engagement in issues relating to the contemporary world and church, including issues of evangelism, church/state relations, colonialism and contextualisation.

The purpose of the unit is to develop a critical approach to missionary thought and practice through an analysis of approaches to Christian mission since apostolic times.

BS111 Old Testament 1

BS111 OT 1 is taught over two days, Wednesday and Friday. This unit aims to lay a foundation for a life of skilled reading and ever---deepening understanding of the Old Testament. It builds on knowledge of the OT as a theological book (Biblical Theology, BS141) to consider the OT as a historical document and a work of literature, with the ultimate aim of enriching the student's theological reading of Scripture. First, in the course of reading through Genesis and Exodus, a number of basic questions are addressed: What is the OT? How does one read it well? From what historical and cultural context did it arise? What sort of literature is it? How does God speak through it? Then, through an overview of the OT as an historical document of the ancient world, a second set of questions is tackled: What material does the OT contain? How does it relate to the world from which it originated? What does it have to say to that world, and to our own?

BS107 Hebrew 1B (BD elective/BTh elective)

Runs over two days Wednesday and Friday.

Building on the Hebrew 1A unit, Hebrew 1B aims to carry students one step further towards a life of study of the Hebrew Old Testament and the message it conveys. The unit focuses on helping students continue to build their basic vocabulary, acquire a basic knowledge of Hebrew grammar and clause-level syntax, develop skills in recognition of key grammatical features within biblical texts, and begin to translate simple narrative texts. A competent use of Hebrew grammar and syntax, and familiarity with lexical tools, will ground the student's subsequent OT exegetical and theological work in the original forms of expression of the text.

CM162 Understanding Buddhism and Islam (elective)

This unit contributes to the Diploma of Bible and Missions and Bachelor of Theology and Bachelor of Divinity courses by enabling students to develop skills of cultural analysis and communication with regard to followers of the two largest non-Christian religions in contemporary Australia, Buddhism and Islam. In doing this it deepens students' sensitivity to this important aspect of Australia's cultural and religious diversity. It relates to CM153 by providing specific knowledge of these two major world religions and their variegated forms in the contemporary world.

CM182 Influences on & Issues for Australian Christian Women (elective)

This unit contributes to the course by exploring the sociological and theological influences contributing to the shaping of identity of Australian Christian women. It focuses on significant issues that have shaped the role of women in Australian society and explores the church's response to these issues from a theological and personal perspective. It relates to the other units in the diploma by moving beyond the historical circumstances to the theological issues that underpin the events. It will assist in the development of the diplomat's ability to theologically reflect on current societal norms through understanding the effects of previous significant issues.
